- **Overpopulation:** As the human population grows, the demand for food, water, housing, and electricity increases. This extra demand puts massive pressure on natural resources.

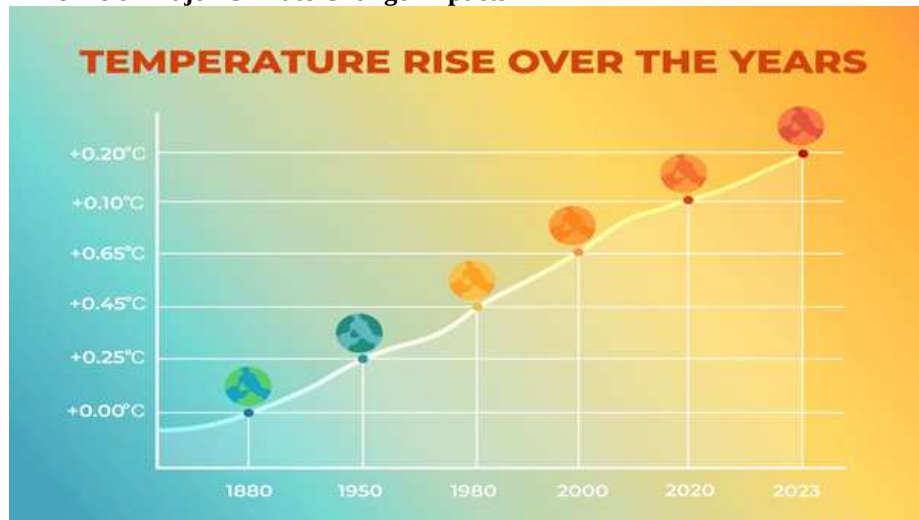
Global Challenges
